I have, therefore, told Bryce that some of these Sutton seeds might have to be given away as it was doubtful whether we would need them. Another year of course a much smaller quantity will be ordered.

As my preliminary letter told you the Beatrix Farrand Agent account is a separate one and therefore the bill rendered by her is paid directly to Beatrix Farrand, Agent, and into that account which is not touched except by permission of the client in whose name it stands.
