Dr. Max Farrand **Died At Reef Point Sunday**

Dr. Max Farrand, noted librarian, historian and teacher, died here at his home, Reef Point, on Sunday afternoon. He was 76 years of age and has been a resident of Bar Harbor for many years.

Since 1941 he has been research associate of the Henry E. Huntington Library and Art Gallery in California, over which he previ-ously presided as director since

1927

Dr. Farrand went to the library from Yale University, where he had been professor of history 17

He was an author and editor of historical works. Among his books were "Framing of the Constitution," published in 1913; "Development of the United States," 1918; "Fathers of the Constitution," in 1921 and "Records of the Federal Convention" in 1911.

Born in Newark, N. J., he was educated at Princeton and did graduate work there and at Leipzig and Heidelberg in Germany.

He was successively instructor, associate professor and professor of history at Wesleyan University from 1896 to 1901, acting professor of American History at Cornell in 1905-06 and went to Yale in 1908.

During his last six years at Yale Dr. Farrand was associated with the Commonwealth Fund, as general director, advisor in educa-tional research and director of

the education division.

He was a fellow of the Ameri-He was a fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences and of the New York Genealogical and Biographical Society, a trustee of California Institute of Technology, a past president of the American Historical Society and a member of the American Philosophical Societies and a trustee of the cal Societies, and a trustee of the American Academy in Rome.

Among the universities which gave him honorary degrees were Wesleyan, Michigan, Southern California, University of California and Princeton.

He leaves his widow, the former Beatrix Jones, whom he married

in 1913.

The funeral is to be private and it is hoped no flowers will be sent, but those who wish to may send token memorial gifts to Reef Point Gardens.
